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## Meeting agenda items

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## **Paper** Agenda item Welcome The Chair thanked Ms Lucy Flemming for hosting the meeting and for providing a tour of the Mines Rescue station. The Chair welcomed and introduced Ms Georgina Beattie, Deputy Secretary, Mining Exploration and Geoscience (MEG), as a special guest to the meeting. Ms Beattie thanked the Chair for the invitation and Coal Services for the tour. 1 Chair's report The Chair noted an apology from Mr Peter Jordan. Mr Linnane advised that: the Hon Souris has been reappointed as chair of MSAC Mr Matthew Freeman has resigned from MSAC Mr Cunningham has elected not to seek reappointment when his position expires on 27 June 2022. 2 **Declaration of interests** Mr Cribb requested that changes be made to his declaration in the pecuniary interests table. Ms Flemming declared that Coal Services is part of the review of coal industry health surveillance scheme. Members agreed this did not preclude Ms Flemming from participating in discussions about the project. Ms Yates declared she is involved in the review of coal industry health surveillance scheme. Members agreed that Ms Yates would not be present at the meeting for agenda item 17. **Actions** A. Secretariat to update the pecuniary interests register with Mr Cribb's amendments.

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The Chair advised that some minor grammatical errors had been made to the draft

# 5 Recommendations for MSAC from the report on the statutory review of the WHS (MPS) laws

- Mr Linnane advised that the recommendation in the paper is for members to discuss the costs and benefits of extending industry safety and health representative roles to non-coal mines and consider what advice should be provided to the Minister.
- Mr Burns said the paper has been drafted to give as much information as possible to members but is not a statement of the Regulator's position. The Resources Regulator's position is that a case hasn't been made in terms of cost benefit. It recognises that more work needs to be done in terms of worker representation as there are low number of HSRs in the industry.
- Mr Skelton advised that the AWU is willing to bear the cost associated with extending industry safety and health representative roles to non-coal mines. There are no issues with eligibility requirements. The concern is that WHS permit holders do not have the same functions that exist in the coal sector.
- Mr Cunningham commented that the metal sector does not support the recommendation. In 2016, there was significant changes in Resources Regulator reforms and how the Regulator operates. Interactions with mine sites has increased and is of a valuable nature, allowing more structured contact.
- Mr Osborne commented that the CFMMEU sees an advantage for workers and that relationships with the Regulator and management on site would be strengthened. If can be done to reinforce safety and regulations, it is worth looking at it.

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#### Paper Agenda item

- Mr Cribb commented that there is not much difference in terms of powers. The only difference is the ability to suspend an operation. The CFMMEU put a lot of energy into the engagement and training of ISHRs. It about level of support that needs to be put in and the number of representatives at sites. There should be a push for more safety representatives at sites.
- Mr Skelton said the fundamental difference in the powers is the ability for a worker representative to accompany an inspector. There have been several occasions where inspectors have gone to site, but workers are not allowed to accompany and assist them.
- Ms Armour commented there appears to be a lack of information as to how effectively those in the non-coal sector can operate.
- Ms Yates commented that it is clear the risks to health extend beyond the coal industry. The difficulty with measuring is that you can't see what can't be measured.
- The Chair said he didn't believe a case has been made out for the change and suggested the outcome was to note the recommendation and leave open for the future but recommend not making a legislative change at this point.

#### **Outcomes**

- A majority of members agreed to advise the Minister that legislative amendment should not be made at this stage to extend industry safety and health representative roles to non-coal mines.
- Mr Brock Skelton, Mr Graeme Osborne and Ms Deborah Yates <u>did not</u> agree to the above resolution.

#### **Actions**

- C. Department to write to the Minister advising MSAC does not agree to extending industry safety and health representative roles to non-coal mines, noting three members did not support this decision.
- Survey of mining industry on perceptions that labour hire and non-permanent workers under-report safety concerns
  - Mr Burns thanked the participants who assisted with drafting the survey and advised members:
    - the survey will be distributed for completion during quarter 1 of 2022
    - the results will be presented to MSAC in quarter 2 of 2022
    - MSAC members will be requested to assist in distributing the survey

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## **Paper** Agenda item it is proposed that the survey will be done via QR code paper copies will also be distributed at mine sites. Mr Burns said the survey can be extended to all the coal sector if MSAC feels it is warranted. Members agreed that the survey should apply to all coal sectors. Mr Osborne advised the CFMEU is happy to distribute the survey to its members. **Outcomes** MSAC agreed to extend the survey to include all coal sectors. **Actions** D. Resources Regulator to distribute the survey to all coal sectors in quarter 1 of 2022. E. Resources Regulator to provide a report on the outcomes of the survey to MSAC members at the June 2022 meeting. 7 Impacts of COVID-19 and mandatory testing in the mining industry Mr Burns advised that: the Resources Regulator has done a lot of work over the past 18 months to assist industry understand its obligations in relation to COVID-19 mandatory vaccinations are a matter for the mining operations in terms of complying with health orders there are several companies who have implemented mandatory vaccinations the Resources Regulator has not received any claims of bullying, harassment or victimisation. Mr Burns said the Resources Regulator checks what risk controls a mine site has implemented for COVID, whether all controls have been considered and whether those controls are being implemented. Ms Yates commented that vaccinations reduce transmission by 50%. They are the only appropriate way to prevent COVID. Most countries are going towards mandatory vaccination. It is a health decision. Mr Burns said here is no requirement for sites to notify the Regulator, but the Regulator are aware of some sites introducing mandatory vaccinations. The Regulator has requested that mine operators advise the Resources Regulator of confirmed cases. There is a legal requirement to notify SafeWork NSW. In the first 12 months of COVID the Resources Regulator received regular phone calls from workers who were
