Paper Agenda item 1 Welcome and Chair's report The Chair commenced the meeting at 8:45am. The Chair delivered an Acknowledgement of Country and welcomed members, delegates and observers to the meeting. **Outcomes** Members noted the: delegates and observers for the meeting o membership changes in 2022 events attended by the Chair since the last meeting o key stakeholder events planned for 2022. 2 **Declaration of interests** Mr Williams requested that "District President, CFMMEU" under Interests and positions in trade unions, professional, business or community associations and organisations column be included in his pecuniary interest declaration. No conflicts of interest were received. **Actions** A. Secretariat to update Mr Williams pecuniary interest declaration. 3 Acceptance of previous minutes and actions No changes were requested to the minutes. **Outcomes** Members endorsed the minutes of the last meeting. Paper Agenda item 5 Implementation of recommendations of the statutory review of the WHS (MPS) laws and Legislative framework update 11 The Chair advised that agenda items 5 and 11 would be discussed together. Mr Linnane provided members with a verbal overview of the papers and outlined the legislative and regulatory amendments. Mr Cribb asked if there was process for reinstating a practising certificate or certificate of competence and if there was a set period before an individual can reapply. Mr Burns replied that there is nothing to stop a certificate being reinstated or an individual from reapplying. One option is to suspend a certificate for a period rather than cancel it. Mr Day commented that if a certificate is cancelled an individual can reapply and that would be assessed on a case-by-case basis. The Department would need to see that the reason for cancellation had been addressed to the satisfaction of the department. Mr Burns advised that the Department would publish a fact sheet to provide as much clarity as possible. Mr Collings arrived at 9:55am. **Outcomes** Members noted that the Work Health and Safety (Mines and Petroleum Sites) Amendment Act 2022 commenced on 1 August 2022. • Members noted that the Work Health and Safety (Mines and Petroleum Sites) Regulation 2022 commenced on 1 September 2022. Members noted the update on legislative developments and reform. 6 Survey of mining industry on perceptions that labour hire and non-permanent workers under-report safety concerns Mr Day provided members with a verbal overview of the paper and advised that: the reason for the MSAC survey was to determine if low level of reporting was an issue in NSW a draft report was sent to members out of session the survey contractor was confident that there was a satisfactory enough response to produce some observations from the data the survey included permanent and non-permanent staff

		the survey highlighted a poor level of comfort in reporting by both permanent and non-permanent staff; it was more prevalent in non-permanent staff
		perception is often reality – the perception is that there will be reprisals for reporting
		there is a difference between managers and workers responses
		there is a lack of knowledge around labour hire companies not being aware of the process to report
		there is a difference between the mature and younger workforce; there is more reluctance for younger workers to report
		the Resources Regulator is commencing a compliance project looking at reporting (coal and metex); the report from that project that will show the level of non-compliance.
		by the end of the year, we should have a good package of information for discussion and analysis
		there is some similarity with Glencore's report.
	Mr Cribb commented that:	
		Glencore's lowest failure was providing information back to people in relation to decision making around actions; there was some comment around high potential incidents and reporting
		he is concerned about the difference between two reports
		when the Glencore survey was undertaken, business stopped to allow workers to complete the survey; there was over 90% participation
		the problem with opt in surveys is a low response rate; if people are given an allocated time to complete the survey, they are more likely to complete it.

		non-paper-based surveys are a problem as mine sites don't allow phones on site
		opt-in surveys can be problematic

Outcomes

Paper Agenda item the background, purpose of the survey and the intention of developing plans from the survey needs to be clearly communicated. Mr Williams commented that the low participation rates were surprising but the results were not as he believes contractors don't report due to fear of reprisal. Mr Cribb commented that MSAC needs to go through results and build action plans to build on the results. Mr Day commented that: the Resources Regulator is undertaking a compliance project in the next six months. The results from that project, in addition to the "Enough is Enough" report and projects in other jurisdictions should all be considered by MSAC as a package once the compliance project is finished. additional work needs to be done around design and communication the results of the survey just completed needs to be put on the Resources Regulator's website with an action plan. Mr Day proposed that a follow-up survey be done next year and then every two years to monitor trends, that would then give long-term results as it is the trend that is important not necessarily one-off results **Outcomes** Members noted the survey report and findings. **Actions** B. MSAC to review the outcomes of the Resources Regulator compliance project in early 2023 to determine if further specific action is required. C. MSAC to coordinate a follow-up survey in late 2023. 8 Resourcing and pipeline of statutory roles under WHS (MPS) laws (schedule 10) Mr Day provided a verbal overview on the paper. Mr Cribb commented that the concerns were more about why we weren't attracting people in the industry not about maintaining them. Mr Burns commented that matters related to competence need to be referred to the Mining and Petroleum Competence Board.

Paper Agenda item Members noted the interim report on audits of practising certificate holders' compliance with their maintenance of competence condition. 9 Member updates Ms Flemming provided members with a verbal overview of the paper. It was agreed that Ms Flemming would provide a break-up of how many order 43 assessments were undertaken. **Outcomes** Members noted the report tabled by Coal Services. **Action** D. Ms Flemming to provide a break-up of order 43 assessments. Presentation Members received a presentation from the Western Australian Department of Mines, Industry Regulation and Safety on its approach to mental health and its Mental Awareness, Respect and Safety program. The Chaired thanked Ms Christina Folley, Ms Clare Ingerman and Mr Ivor Roberts for their time and presentations. It was agreed that the secretariat would collate questions from MSAC members and send through to WA. **Actions** E. Secretariat to send questions from MSAC members to WA out of session. 7 Psychosocial hazards (including bullying and harassment) Mr Burns commented that in the last three years the Resources Regulator has received 42 complaints about bullying, harassment and intimidation. In last 12 months the number of complaints has doubled. Ms Flemming commented that this is also reflected though Coal Mines Insurance with 13 claims in the last 6 months with an increase in females reporting. **Outcomes** Members noted the paper. 10 **National Dust Diseases Task Force**

- Mr Burns provided members with a verbal overview of the paper.
- Mr Burns delivered a presentation to members on collisions involving mobile plant, noting:
 - there area of most concern is the open cut sector
 - the Resources Regulator is deploying inspectors to sites after an incident
 - an industry round table was held three years ago
 - all incidents had administrative controls in place; if engineering controls were installed, the likelihood of the incident occurring would have been reduced.
